


Original Survey in 1859 by James McBride. Set wood post and the following B.T.'s; Sugar, 16", N.51°E., 13 1ks., Sugar, 24", S.50°W., 20 1ks.

In 1904 Nathan Smith found an original B.T. broken off. Marks plain. He measured $39.74\frac{1}{2}$ chains from the SE Section Corner of Section 11.

In 1982 Milo Stefan, RLS, found a mound of stone at the corner area. No other evidence located.

In 1984, Alan Harrison, RLS, found mound of stone as found by Stefan in 1982. According to Phil Gentz, adjacent landowner, the rock pile has been there for many years and used as the corner. Distance from rock pile South to Section Corner is 39.61 chains vs. $39.74\frac{1}{2}$ chains measured by Nathan Smith in 1904. In center of rock pile set a 2" X 36" aluminum monument and made bearing trees as noted below.

 - 3. Sugar, 13", S.52°E., 30.91 feet.
 - 4. Sugar, 11", S.83°W., 38.86 feet.
 - 5. Steel Sign Post, Northeast, 1.90 feet.


