


In 1865, H. Nowlin and J. L. Nowlin set corner and the following BTs: Fir, 6", N.51°W., 10 links; Birch, 14", S.70°E., 33 links; 4 chains, north, swamp bears northeast and southwest; 4.5 chains, west, swamp bears northeast and southwest.

In 1966, J. Resvick found a 3" x 3" scribed Pine post in mound of rock. Post rotted off once or twice. Hemlock stump scribed T38, R14, S23, bears S.50°E., 43.0', 26" in diameter, sawed off above scribing. FS location post on fallen Balsam bears S.20°E., 35'. Swamp north 4 chains and west 1½ chains.

In 1986, Alan Harrison found corner as per Resvick. Pulled to position 4.5 chains east of swamp to the west and 4 chains south of swamp to the north. Could find no evidence of corner. Accepted corner as per Resvick as best available evidence and placed a 2" x 36" aluminum monument.
