

In 1859, James McBride set wood post with the following BTs: Birch, 14", N.27°W., 29 links; Sugar, 8", N.48°E., 4 links; Birch, 12", S.25°E., 28 links; Sugar, 12", S.29°W., 30 links.


1906, 1909, and 1916, N. Smith was at this corner for subdivisions of Sections 10, 11, and 15. Called stake by W. L. Harris in 1906.

In 1934, J. W. White found rotted stake. Location poster on fence corner north approximately 15 feet. Corner in center of road.

In 1986, Alan Harrison found corner falls in road. Set P.K. nail by aligning centerline of State Highway 52 east and south and off fence line north. This position fits Smith's 1909 survey of Section 15.
