

(b) Describe any record evidence, monument evidence, occupational evidence, testimonial evidence or any other material evidence you considered, and whether the monument was found or placed. In 1859 James McBride set a wood post with the following BT's: Spruce, 6", N.45W., 37 lks; Spruce, 6", N.55E., 7 lks.
In 1911 J.J. Melindy found a 4"x4" post 10" below road surface and made new BT's: Tamarack, 6", S.48½E., 47 lks; Tamarack, 4", N.47 3/4W., 34 7/8 lks; Spruce, 4", N.56E., 35 lks.
In 1936 W. Engblom found: a cedar post buried in center of road; Tamarack, 6", S.49E., 46 lks. He placed a metal location tag on a 6" white post S.87E. 30 lks from corner.
In 1982 M. Stefan (RLS) found fence corner 31.25 ft. west of centerline of road. Fences run west and north. Found no post or BT's. Restored corner postition at centerline Rd. and at extension of fence line from west as best remaining evidence.


